SOUTH AFRICA: Safari Conservation Expedition™

Be on the front lines of animal conservation, and learn how to track, monitor and protect South Africa's most majestic wild animals.

OVERVIEW

On this program you will experience life on two renowned game reserves and learn about hands-on conservation on the front lines. You might spot Africa's "Big Five" in the region — lions, leopards, elephants, Cape buffalo and rhino. By night, you'll live at a rustic Home Base on the reserve, hearing traditional stories and learning about tribal culture. By day, shadow wildlife conservationists in the South African bush on game drives to track and observe animals and learn about sustainably preserving the region's endangered keystone species.

SPOTLIGHT ON COMMUNITY SERVICE

Join conservationists in the field, assisting with habitat restoration and wildlife monitoring. Help create a database of Identity kits of Giraffes on the reserve, learn about anti-poaching, undertake a snare patrol to identify leopards, and learn from wildlife protectors about their experiences fighting poachers. Track the movements of Lions & Cheetahs and other wildlife by satellite, and learn how rangers set camera traps—join them in combing through video footage. Finally, learn how the surrounding local community is critical to long term, sustainable conservation.

SAMPLE ITINERARY: DAILY BREAKDOWN

Actual schedule of activities will vary by program session. The information detailed here is typical for what you can expect to experience; however, service work and activities vary depending upon the needs of our local community partners, various celebrations and customs, as well as the weather and specific needs of the student group.



DAY 1: WELCOME TO SOUTH AFRICA!

Touch down in Johannesburg, the heart of South Africa! GLA staff will greet you upon your arrival, and our group will drive together to a local hotel for an overnight stay in Johannesburg. Rest up, because we'll be heading out early the next morning for a road trip to Home Base in the African bush.

DAY 2: SUNSET IN THE RESERVE

We'll travel for most of the day, making our way to Home Base on the game reserve. While the drive is long, the views of South Africa are breathtaking. Take the time to get to know your fellow travelers before we arrive for a traditional welcome lunch. After lunch, we'll hike down to our homebase for the next few days where you can settle in on the vast and peaceful grounds, located right along a biodiversity corridor where migratory animals travel.









DAY 3- 4: KAYAKING DOWN THE TUGELA RIVER TO A BUSH SLEEPOUT UNDER THE STARS

Prepare to experience a bush sleepout where we'll camp out in comfy tents with stretcher beds. Professional field guides will help keep watch. While at camp we'll learn more about tracking animals on foot, go on bush walks to study the region's biology and ecology and just enjoy being in nature. At night, we'll go on an Aardvark night walk to see if we can spot these elusive creatures.

We will end with an open-fire cooking competition under the starry night. Team up and show off your skills!

Ever wondered how scientists figured out that birds go South for the winter or how much birds weigh? On Day 4, we assist conservationists with their mist netting & bird ringing research project. Students will help take note of the morphological data like weight, size and health. In the afternoon, we're working to develop Giraffe Identity Kits for the giraffes on the Zingela reserve. You will learn how to track, survey and identify Giraffes, take photos and develop kits that can be used by conservationists to identify individual animals. This important data helps conservation teams monitor their health and population on the reserve

DAY 5: TRANSFER TO NAMBITI BIG FIVE GAME RESERVE

After a short transfer from Zingela Reserve to Nambiti Big Five Game REserve, students will hike out of the valley to take in the magnificent views of this reserve.

As this will be our main service site, we will get an overview of the research being conducted on the reserve as well as an introduction to the use of telemetry to track and monitor animals.

After dinner, a night drive will introduce you to the nocturnal wildlife species that one normally does not see during the day. You will get involved in monitoring activities that will help to collect data on these lesser known species!

DAY 6 -10: CONSERVATIONISTS IN TRAINING

Over the next few days, we'll get stuck into service work around the reserve. We'll split into 3 groups and rotate through the different service work the reserve has asked us to assist with. Each student will have the opportunity to volunteer in each group:

- Group 1. Rhino Monitoring session, tracking black & white rhino with reserve monitors
- Group 2. Anti poaching unit session & snare removal
- Group 3. Reserve management support & camera traps monitoring

Monitoring of endangered species, such as rhino, is a critical management activity as it ensures that individuals and family groups are safe and thriving. You will learn how to use telemetry, how to identify individual animals through their ear notches and how to capture the data so it supports the work of reserve managers and









the anti-poaching unit.

Be exposed to the important work of the Anti-Poaching Unit (APU) and assist by checking if there are holes in fences (where poachers enter) and collect wire snares that are used to illegally hunt animals. Activities conducted with armed rangers

Ensuring the long-term protection of a wilderness area requires ongoing projects that manage road repair, broken fences, address alien plant invasion and assist with the overall management of the reserve. This rotation will be focussed on supporting these projects and getting involved in activities that expose you to the behind-the-scenes work of a wildlife reserve. Camera traps are cameras that are secured to trees and are triggered by movement. They are important tools for monitoring wildlife that are elusive (such as leopards) and/or nocturnal (such as hyenas). Cameras traps are placed in strategic locations and photos are downloaded and analysed to find out what wildlife is in the area and it helps to monitor their movements and behaviour. This forms an important part of the research conducted in the area

Throughout the service , we'll learn from local biologists and conservationists about the issues that have reduced the Black Rhino population by 98% in the last thirty years. They range from land development to poaching for the illegal, international trade of rhino horn to parks being overrun by non-indigenous plant species..

Guaranteeing a rhino sighting is near impossible, as the animals graze and wander at their own will across the large sanctuary—but keep your fingers crossed! You'll be able to track their whereabouts in real time with the conservation team, and are guaranteed to see countless other wild animals daily at close proximity, like the African wild dog, impala, kudu, nyala, giraffe and many others.

DAY 11: LOCAL COMMUNITY SERVICE, TRADITIONAL STORIES & LOCAL CRAFTS

Life on the reserve is very far removed from the tourist path, so prepare to encounter a wealth of traditional culture. Today you will spend the day in a local village to participate in specific projects that are being supported at the time. Project Rhino & Move Africa are local NGO's that we have worked with over the past few years, helping to facilitate their projects in the reserve's community.

Hear stories straight from the source by spending time with local families and enjoying tea with the community *Gogo* (grandmother). Try your hand at making traditional crafts and shop from artisans for handmade beadwork, intricate basketry and colorful pottery.

In the afternoon, we'll go on a Big Five Bush Walk. A highlight of a wilderness experience is having the opportunity to hike through the bush that is the animals' home. This is your opportunity to walk with experienced and qualified guides through the territory of the Big 5. While there is always the chance of seeing larger mammals, this is also an opportunity to learn about smaller animals on the reserve, as well as to identify the tracks and signs of the bush



DAY 12 - 13: WILDLIFE SPOTTING & WRAPPING UP SERVICE

Rise early for memorable adventures driving through the misty game reserve. If we're lucky (and quiet), it's possible that we'll see tracked rhinos, elephants and lions while on our snare patrols. Time to comb through the last of the camera footage you collected from the camera traps and report back on your findings. Appreciate the majesty of these wild animals—how can we give them protection that lasts for generations?

DAY 14 ONLY: DEPARTURE TO JNB

Time to say *Hamba Kahle*—"goodbye" in Zulu—to South Africa! We'll depart for the Johannesburg airport together, and GLA staff will make sure that everyone is checked in for their flight and ready to embark on their journey home.

21 DAY ONLY

ST LUCIA & CAPE VIDAL

DAY 14: TRANSFER TO ST LUCIA & iSimangaliso WETLAND PARK

Adventure time! We'll get an early start and travel coastward to St Lucia Wetlands Park and Cape Vidal Game Reserve for the remainder of our program.

The iSimangaliso Wetland Park is one of the outstanding natural wetland and coastal sites of Africa. These include coral reefs, long sandy beaches, coastal dunes, lake systems, swamps, and extensive reed and papyrus wetlands, providing critical habitat for a wide range of species from Africa's seas, wetlands and savannahs. The interaction of these environments with major floods and coastal storms in the Park's transitional location has resulted in continuing speciation and exceptional species diversity. Its vivid natural spectacles include nesting turtles and large aggregations of flamingos and other waterfowl.

DAY 15 - 17: CROCODILE CENTER SERVICE & BOAT HIPPO BOAT EXCURSION

Over the next few days, we will volunteer at the KwaZulu-Natal Crocodile Center, where we'll put in some hours by supporting conservation projects here ; supporting research and assisting with the centres daily needs for the crocs. In the afternoons, we will visit the local markets or go on a boat ride in the iSmangaliso Wetland Park estuary to spot some of the area's famous hippos & crocs!

DAY 19 - 20: SERVICE , WHALE WATCHING & CAPE VIDAL

The whale season on the east coast of South Africa is from June -November. Humpback whales migrate to tropical waters in winter. Today we'll head out on a boat to admire these majestic animals and











learn more about why it's so important for us to protect these creatures.

We'll spend our final excursion day in Cape Vidal Game Reserve: Snorkeling and an open-vehicle game drive are on today's agenda. Check out the towers from which humpback whales are monitored on their migration up the African coastline.

DAY 21: DEPARTURE TO KING SHAKA INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

Time to say *Hamba Kahle*—"goodbye" in Zulu—to South Africa! We'll depart for King Shaka International airport (DUR) together, and GLA staff will make sure that everyone is checked in for their flight and ready to embark on their journey home.

TRAVELING TO SOUTH AFRICA

GLA HOME BASE | On this safari adventure, students will lodge in several locations. Upon arrival in Johannesburg, the group will stay in a guest lodge. For the remainder of the program, Home Base accommodations include wooden cabins, canvas cottages, and a safari camp, which is outside under the stars. Students will share accommodations with roommates and have access to bathrooms, and enjoy communal meals as a group.

FOOD | Staples of South African food include rice and potatoes, stew with vegetables and chicken or beef served with *pap*, similar to cornmeal. *Braai* is a traditional barbecue that is a must-try for every visitor to South Africa.

CLIMATE | South Africa will be in its winter season in June and July, so expect sunny days and brisk evenings!
